Branch Annual Meeting Actions

WASHINGTON – AAUW launched the **Elect Her initiative** — to expand the pipeline of women running for elective office, an effort that could change the face of politics in America. Women now hold just 17 percent of the seats in Congress and 24 percent of seats in state legislatures.

AAUW's Elect Her initiative aims to close the long-standing political leadership gender gap by empowering and training women to run for office at all levels. The initiative consists of a full continuum of programming. The centerpiece is Elect Her — Campus Women Win, in which AAUW, in conjunction with Running Start, will train college women to run for campus-based elective office. Additionally, AAUW will promote Running Start's successful Young Women's Political Leadership High School Program and the Women's Campaign Forum's She Should Run campaign, which also has Running Start's

support. Workshops led by experts in the field on public speaking, messaging, networking, on-camera media training, and platform development are ways that encourage the girls to channel their leadership into politics.

"AAUW, Running Start, and the Women's Campaign Forum are committed to helping women become leaders on their campuses and in their communities. We focus on the different aspects of the leadership gap, but our ultimate goal is to have better representation of women at all levels — from the highest halls of government to student government," said AAUW Executive Director Linda D. Hallman, CAE.

This spring, Elect Her trainings took place at **Duke University**, **University of Alabama**, **University of Virginia and Western Washington University**.

Global Gender Pay Gap Unchanged in Last Decade

A new report by the International Trade Union Confederation found that women are paid 18 percent less than men on average worldwide. The report, *Frozen in Time: Gender Pay Gap Unchanged for 10 Years*, analyzed women's wages in 43 countries and concluded that no significant progress had been made in closing the global gender pay gap for more than a decade. The report found that workers in traditionally unionized sectors tend to fare better in terms of the gender pay gap. The report also showed that childrearing is much more detrimental to female wages than to male wages. AAUW has long fought to end wage discrimination. We believe that equal pay for equal work is a simple matter of justice for women. Wage discrimination affects the economic security of families today and directly affects retirement security as women look down the road. AAUW strongly supports initiatives that seek to close the persistent and sizable wage gaps between men and women, and minorities as well.

We invite you to mark Equal Pay Day, Tuesday, April 17, by spreading the word about the gender pay gap and AAUW.

Legal Advocacy Update



AAUW Supports Second Military Sexual Assault Case

On March 6, eight current and former service members filed a lawsuit against U.S. Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta and numerous Marine Corps officers. The plaintiffs are accusing military officials of creating a

culture in which sexual assault and rape is tolerated and in which people who report it face retaliation. AAUW is providing support to this case and to *Cioca v. Rumsfeld*, which also deals with the issue of sexual assault in the military. The new case focuses on assault and harassment in the U.S. Marine Barracks in Washington, D.C. Lawyer Susan Burke plans to file additional lawsuits focused on similar crimes in other branches of the military. AAUW Executive Director Linda Hallman spoke at the March 6 press conference and emphasized that AAUW would stand with these courageous women as they work to create a safer environment for women in the military.
