

In 2010, 57 % of community college students were women. About a quarter are mothers and many have significant work and family responsibilities. Dr. Hill will talk about the AAUW report *Women in Community College: Access to Success.* This report identifies challenges facing student parents and opportunities in STEM fields, as well how community colleges can provide more women with a reliable path to opportunity and economic security.

Catherine Hill is a Director of Research at AAUW and an author or co-author of many AAUW reports including Women in Community College: Access to Success (2013); Graduating to a Pay Gap: The Earnings of Women and Men One Year after College Graduation (2012); Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School (2011);

Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (2010) and Where the Girls Are: the Facts about Gender Equity in Education (2008). Before coming to AAUW, Dr. Hill was a Study Director at the Institute for Women's Policy Research and an assistant professor at the University of Virginia. She has a bachelor and master's degree from Cornell University and a Ph.D. in policy development from Rutgers University

PROFILING: TAKE A LOOK AT YOURSELF



YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THIS: As a member of AAUW, you have access to the AAUW Member Service Database (MSD). You can use the MSD to update your member record and contact information, make a contribution, and track your membership and giving history for tax purposes. Additionally, branch members can view their branch member roster and leader contacts on the MSD.

Your personal record on the MSD is called your **Profile**. It is extremely important that your Profile information be accurate. WHY? National and AAUW of Virginia use mailing and emailing addresses to send AAUW *Outlook*, Virginia *Vision*, voting ballots, and other information to you.

HOW TO ACCESS THE MSD AND CHECK YOUR INFORMATION

If you do not have a computer, call 800/326-2289 and ask to speak to someone in Membership, and ask about your Profile.

If you have online access, visit www.aauw.org and click at the very top to login with your AAUW Member ID. If you don't have that number, it takes seconds to obtain it by clicking on Forgot AAUW Member ID? Another way to obtain your ID is to call 800/326-AAUW (2289) and ask for it. Your ID is also on your copy of AAUW Outlook.

If this is the first time you have logged in, you will *Need to Register*. Click on that and follow the directions to create a personal password.

Now you are ready to *Enter Member Service Database*. Then, click on *My Profile* in the top left column. Is your information correct? If not, make changes as directed. You can also print out a membership card to keep your Member ID handy.

Check right now to see if your MSD information is correct! Make sure your Profile is correct so that you receive everything from AAUW and AAUW of Virginia that is sent to you. (If you do not want to receive anything from AAUW you may call the number above and ask to have your info flagged.)

AAUW RELEASES STATE RANKINGS ON EQUAL PAY BASED ON NEW CENSUS DATA

The American Association of University Women (AAUW), on September 19, released its latest analysis of the gender pay gap, which shows that the gap is narrowest in the District of Columbia, where women's median earnings are 90 percent of men's, and widest in Wyoming, where women earn just 64 percent of what men earn. Nationally, women working full time are paid only 77 percent of what men are paid, just as they were a decade ago.

The AAUW report, *The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap*, was updated with statistics released recently by the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey. The *Simple Truth* outlines steps that employers and the federal government can take to help close the pay gap. AAUW has also published analyses of the pay gap in each congressional district. You're going through a box of loose papers from the 1950's and come across a beautifully hand-

long. You look at the signature, and it's from Rachel Carsen. She is thanking AAUW for giving her the Achievement Award in 1956 and stating she will use the money to do research for her next book. That book turned out to be Silent Spring.

This actually happened to me as a member of the AAUW Archives Corps, which meets at AAUW headquarters downtown once a month to work on boxes from our archives that need to be culled and put into archival condition. The letter proved what we have always thought: that the money from AAUW directly helped Rachel Carson write Silent Spring.

There are 17 local AAUW members in the Archives Corps,

but most are from Maryland branches. We can use more members—and we need more from Virginia to find these incredible pieces of AAUW history (can't let Marylanders get all the good stuff). Work is done the first Monday and Tuesday of each month. The hours are flexible but generally people come in about 9:30 or 10 and work until 2 or 2:30. It goes all year, but we have fewer attendees in July and August because of vacation times. But that's part of the beauty of it--vou don't have to come every month. New members receive training from the AAUW archivist, plus you are also with members who have been doing this for almost 2 years now who can help you. And it's fun to meet members from other branches. There is a lot of "Oh my gosh—listen to this!"

Whether fighting for gender equity in education, championing moderate jurists for federal courts, or supporting measures to improve economic security, the AAUW Action Fund Capitol Hill Lobby Corps is on the scene.

Once a week, volunteer members and college student interns give the AAUW Action Fund a voice and a face on Capitol Hill. Since its formation in 1972, the Lobby Corps has made tens of thousands of visits to congressional offices, making AAUW a familiar and respected name among members of Congress and their staffs.

Because this corps has worked hand in hand with lobbying staff, AAUW has had a significant political impact on legislation concerning issues such as

education,
civil rights,
reproductive rights, and
economic security.

Eligibility and Training AAUW Action Fund members and college students who study in the metropolitan Washington, D.C., area are welcome to join Lobby Corps. No experience or expertise is necessary — only a commitment to promoting AAUW's policy priorities. Volunteers receive comprehensive training as well as briefings on key issues that are likely to come before Congress.

Lobbying Every Thursday morning that Congress is in session — about 30 Thursdays a year — the Lobby Corps is briefed on that week's priority and then proceeds to selected congressional offices to educate policy makers. Members make more than 1,200 visits each session and report back to AAUW Action Fund staff with helpful information for follow-up and grassroots activities.
