MUSINGS OF A FIRST TIME CONFERENCE ATTENDEE PART 1 CHERYL SPOHNHOLTZ

Saturday morning the Mayor of Herndon, **Lisa Merkel**, welcomed us to the city and encouraged us all to take advantage of the 120 restaurants in the 4 square mile town of Herndon.



Judge Jane Roush, who presided over the beltway *sniper trial of Lee Malvo* back in 2003, gave the keynote address. She spoke of her law career, paying tribute to **Elizabeth Tomkins**, the first women to graduate from the University of Virginia Law School back in 1923. From being a real estate lawyer, she was elected to be a Fairfax County Judge in 1993. In July 2015, she was nominated for the *Virginia Supreme Court*, and served as an interim Justice until March of 2016, when Republicans blocked her confirmation.



Another new facet to this year's conference was the introduction of *"mini-break"* sessions – a selection of short 45 -minute breakouts offering a variety of activities, including brainstorming fun ways to get and keep new members, chair yoga, taking a walk, visiting the international vendors, buying raffle tickets for LAF baskets, and socializing.



Break Time

Rebecca Norlander, AAUW National Board member from Washington State, presented an AAUW State of the Union, including showing us the new *"elevator speech"* video for AAUW. Rather than trying to tell someone all about what AAUW offers, it boils down to "A membership community that is changing the climate for women and girls". She recommended that everyone take the *Bias quiz* on the website, to determine what unconscious biases we may

hold. She also mentioned the *Elect Her programs* on college campuses as well as the *Start Smart* effort that teaches graduating women how to negotiate their initial salary.

MUSINGS OF A FIRST TIME CONFERENCE ATTENDEE PART 2 CHERYL SPOHNHOLTZ

After lunch on Saturday, there were three workshops to choose: *Leading in Philanthropy, Leading on Campus, and Leading for Equitable Treatment.* I attended the campus session and was extremely impressed with the college student panel that showed how the AAUW programs made an impact on their lives.



The next session on Saturday was all about body language. **Chris Ulrich** presented a fast paced entertaining look at how body language impacts everything we do. He talked about *Develop*, *Decode, and Deliver*.

The first part of understanding body language is to figure out a person's baseline. What is a person's "normal"? Then when you note changes to that baseline – stop. Those are "hot spots". Finally, ask open-ended powerful questions to get at the meaning behind the body language. **Chris** gave some great hints, like *"When we grab our chin, we're about to win"* and *"you've got to frame yourself to fame yourself"* – when you walk into a room, pause for a second and lean against the doorway. He talked about appropriate eye contact in a professional setting – you should be looking at the triangle formed by the eyes and the nose. If you look at the forehead you are perceived as arrogant, while looking at someone's lips can be seen as flirtatious.

The **Woman of Achievement** dinner honored astronaut and physicist **Dr. Kathryn Thornton**, who regaled us with her story about becoming an astronaut while also balancing being a wife and mother. She mentioned going to Houston for astronaut training with her two year old daughter in tow – and how her male classmates pitched in to babysit so she could get her required flight hours. What an impressive lady!

Sunday's highlight was the **Women Breaking Through** panel, which included **Rear Admiral Sandy Daniels**, a Navy pilot; **Ally Hamlin**, PG County Homicide Detective and Quarterback for the DC Divas; and **Stacey Kincaid**, Sheriff of Fairfax County. The panel moderator, **Rebecca Norlander**, asked great questions. A few themes emerged: You don't need to force everyone to be the same, you just need to be sure everyone has the same opportunity; Start from the premise that we're all human – if we start there maybe we can move forward; we're not looking for diversity but infinite variety/possibilities; change is disappointing people at a rate they're comfortable with.
