



OFF TO LOBBY DAY THEY WENT

Representing the Mt Vernon Branch, Rosemarie Petz and Mary J. Wall participated in the October 17 AAUW Lobby Day focused on supporting passage in the Senate of the Paycheck Fairness Act (PFA) (S.270). They joined 33 fellow AAUW members, organized into 10 teams, to visit 47 Senators currently sponsoring the PFA to thank them for their efforts, to share new AAUW research on the pay gap by state and congressional district, and urge them to raise public awareness of the PFA and to encourage their Republican colleagues to support this fundamental legislation and to call for its swift

They were warmly greeted by all senate offices who reported they depend on, and actively use, AAUW research and statistics.

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LOBBY DAY

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Many, including **Smriti Krishnan** from **Senator Jones'** office, noted the importance of the recency of the data, underlined the AAUW website they use to view data detail, and encouraged us to promote the legislation with Senators from swing states.

After completing meetings with their five assigned senate offices, **Rosemarie and Mary** met with representatives of **Congressman Bobby Scott** (Newport News, VA). The visit was facilitated by her grandson, **Austin Barbera**, Press Secretary. In addition to a photo with **Congressman Scott** who was running between meetings, they met with his Chief of Staff, **David Baile**, and spent an hour with **Veronique Pluviose**, Staff Director for Education and Labor. She reported they used AAUW pay disparity data at their Hispanic Heritage event last week; they continue to need disaggregated data that separates job titles, pay, and employee performance. They would also like to have additional sub-group detail. For example, "Asian" heritage is insufficient; they need categories by country of origin.

Priscilla has a daughter, son, and three grandsons. She enjoys cooking for fun, phone talk with her twin sister, a variety of volunteer activities, reading for pleasure, travel, and doing anything related to her children and grandsons. She notes with pride that she received

her BS degree in Home Economics from the first college in the world chartered to grant degrees to women (1836), Wesleyan College in Macon, Georgia.

A MONUMENTAL DAY

October 14, Richmond Times Dispatch:

"A monumental day: Seven statues unveiled at Virginia Women's Monument on Capitol Square"

AAUW members from around the state attended the dedication of the Virginia Women's Monument, along with hundreds of others. "Seven life-size bronze statues of Virginia women were installed on a granite plaza just below the Capitol, surrounded by a Wall of Honor bearing the names of 230 prominent Virginia women etched on glass, with room for more names to be added in the future. Five more statues are to be added, for a total of 12."



"The goal of the monument is to highlight women who have made significant — but often unrecognized — contributions to Virginia. The statues have been installed at eye level so that visitors can walk around and interact with them."

"This monument embodies the goals of the Women's Monument Commission: not to put women on a pedestal, not to have a mythic or symbolic figure, but to honor

real women who did real things in this commonwealth," said former state Sen. Mary Margaret Whipple, vice chair of the Women's Monument Commission, at Monday's event.
