# **GUEST SPEAKER AAUW FELLOW MAYA KEARNEY**



Maya S. Kearney is a socio-cultural and urban anthropologist, specializing in urban ethnographic methodologies, carceral studies, as well as urban policy and spatial transformation. She has had over 15 years of both academic and applied training in anthropology and attended one of two remaining anthropology programs at a Historically Black College and University (HBCU), Spelman College. She strives to understand the how and why of urban issues and phenomena that disproportionately impact Black communities to inform strategies for restorative and transformative justice. Her dissertation builds on this research where she identified housing as the most important need of prisoner reentry by examining how gentrification impacts access to stable and affordable housing for individuals returning with a felony conviction (returning citizens). Maya's work has been supported by the American Association of University Women (AAUW), American Association of Geographers (AAG), and American Anthropological Association (AAA).



# NOVEMBER BRANCH PROGRAM PATSY QUICK

Our November 19 program called **Why All the Recent Attention on Public Education?** was extremely interesting and important. Speakers **Holly Hazzard** (<u>4PublicEducation.org</u>) and **Karen Corbett Sanders** (Mt. Vernon District representative on the Fairfax County School Board) addressed issues about decision-making regarding curriculum, understaffing in schools. book

banning, and public school funding and quality. Both had specific information and data about the quality of Virginia schools and contradicted many of false accusations being made by parents, politicians, and others who may not have public education's best interest in mind. The information from Holly, as a concerned citizen who with other local individuals founded 4PublicEducation in 2021 in response to increasing attacks on public education, championed public education. The goal of the organization is "to reinstate truthful and civil conversations about education." Karen Corbett Sanders balanced Holly's information with data and statistics. # Together We Bake: A Place that Empowers Women

On a Friday morning in November AAUW members from the Mt Vernon and Alexandria branches visited **Together We Bake** (TWB), an Alexandria non-profit dedicated to training underserved

women in a range of skills and thus empowering them to gain self sufficiency.

TWB executive director **Stephanie Wright** co-founded the program ten years ago with **Tricia Sabatini**, director of operations, who operated a small baking business out of her home. The eight to ten-week program is centered on culinary skills and leads to the nationally recognized ServSafe certificate. By attaining the certificate, the women are on a path toward preferential hiring and higher wages. But the program includes a range of skills beyond culinary training, such as life skills, business practices, financial literacy, mindfulness training, and how to respond to any form of triggering.

When the program started in 2012, participants were almost exclusively formerly incarcerated women. To-day the students may include immigrants, homeless women, and others who face barriers to employment. "Unfortunately, most have the shared experience of abuse and trauma," **Stephanie** said. "Here they find a sisterhood, women they can count on, something they haven't had before."

TWB likes to hire its graduates. Among them is **Mackenzie Criswell**, who served time in prison while her daughter was young. "I always wanted to be a baker," she told us. But the program meant so much more to her than that, she explained. At TWB she gained something she hadn't realized she needed—the support and friendship of other women with shared experiences. Today **Mackenzie** not only helps produce delicious granola and chocolate chip cookies in the TWB kitchen, but she also handles a range of duties for TWB, including mentoring women currently in the program.

#### **How Can AAUW Members Help?**

**Stephanie** described job counseling as a "very rewarding volunteer opportunity." TWB would prepare the volunteer for how best to guide a woman preparing to enter the job market.
