
BUT HERE ARE OUR TOP 9 REASONS: (It's all we could fit!)

- More than 320 recipients received \$6 million in AAUW fellowships and grants for the 2022–23 academic year—the highest amount in our history! The funding advances educational and professional opportunities for women in the United States and around the globe.
- In the third year of the pandemic, AAUW continued to grow its online programs, hosting more than 58 webinars.
- AAUW's Start Smart and Work Smart salary negotiation trainings continued to be AAUW's most soughtafter programs, reaching more than 4,000 participants in 2022, and over 190,000 to date.
- We continued our work with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and other minorityserving institutions (MSIs), thanks to a generous grant from The Coca-Cola Foundation. A total of 17 minority-serving colleges, including 8 HBCUs, 7 women's colleges and 2 MSIs, now offer AAUW's Start Smart training, bringing the number of colleges and universities currently hosting the program to 77.
- Our powerful annual National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) engage over 500 students from more that 300 college campuses nationwide through workshops, panels and an inspiring keynote from Nikole Hannah-Jones, creator of The 1619 Project.
- In its second year, AAUW's STEMEd for Girls program gave over 200 participants and their caregivers the
 opportunity to explore STEM subjects and careers.
- AAUW's Two-Minute Activists sent 19,539 letters to elected officials calling for action on AAUW priorities such as pregnant worker fairness, voting rights, confirming Ketanji Brown Jackson to the Supreme Court, and more.
- THE SIMPLE TRUTH THE ABOUT THE GENDER PAY GAP, 2022 Update used the earnings ratio
 of all workers for the first time including seasonal and part-time employees to capture a more accurate picture of the labor market. Previous versions of the report used only data of fulltime workers.



SUPPORT FOR GREEN SPACE

On March 19, President Patsy Quick wrote a letter to Supervisor Storck regarding equity funding for green spaces in Fairfax County.

Supervisor Dan Storck,

I am writing in support of equity funding for the following that was left out of the budget for the Fairfax County Park Authority. On behalf of the 43 members of Mt. Vernon AAUW, I am asking that the funding recommendations of Nature Forward be included to ensure FCPA has the funds to make our parks accessible and enjoyable for all residents. Please fund the items below. This is an important issue for us and our community. We thank you.

(1) Fully fund a mobile nature center for \$229,279 to bring nature to communities who need it.
(2) Fully fund new "activation staff" for \$314,000 to help parks be more engaging and welcoming to all visitors, particularly those in areas which have suffered divestment.

(3) Fully fund essential interpretation and translation for \$50,000 to ensure equitable access to park signage, meetings, or outreach efforts in languages of people commonly served for those parks.

(4) Begin funding the Park Ranger Pilot Program for \$500,000 to allow the Park Authority to safely respond to many incidents with education rather than police involvement.

Patsy Quick was honored as one of four AAUW of Virginia's Named Honorees. (Other recipients were **Sandy Lawrence, Caroline Pickens, and Kristin Moyer.)** This was a complete surprise and is for her the most memorable moment during the Conference!

Janet Hedrick reports: The conference was quite educational with outstanding presentations throughout the day.



The keynote speaker, **Dr. Cassandra Newby-Alexander** (left), highlighted extraordinary African American Women who have a long history of advocacy. Many of these women were introduced to me for the first time. One which I found extremely interesting was Frances Ellen Watkins Harper. She was an American abolitionist, suffragist, poet, temperance activist, teacher, public speaker, and writer. Beginning in 1845, at the age of twenty, she was one of the first African American women to be published in the United States. "Bury Me in a Free Land" is one of her touching poems in which she asks that she not be buried in a land of slaves.

Solveig Eggerz reports: I was impressed by keynote speaker Cassandra Newby-Alexander, PhD, who described many women who kept "annoying" men by "knocking at the door" never giving up, insisting on being let in. "Be annoying," Newby-Alexander told the audience.

Among those women was Sarah Garland Boyd Jones (1866–1905), who earned her medical degree at Howard University in 1890 and became the only African American woman practicing medicine in Virginia. Founder of the Medical and Chirurgical Society of Richmond in 1902 and Richmond Community Hospital, she died of a massive stroke at age 39.

Marissa A. Rice, (far right with mother, Tammie Mullins-Rice, state board member) who earned her PhD in neuroscience at Cornell University, 2020, today investigates the ecological impacts and neural mechanisms of spatial ability. Dr. Rice described the manifold costs that a long term education entails and how she, a minority student and daughter of a single mother, benefitted from the Ronald E. McNair Achievement Program for the Post-Baccalaureate and the Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation.




BRANCH MEMBERS OUT AND ABOUT

RESTON-HERNDON INVITATION



EVERYONE is welcomed to join the Reston-Herndon Branch of AAUW and Fairfax county librarians Chris Barbuschak and Suzanne S. LaPierre to discuss their new book "**Desegregation in Northern Virginia Libraries**."

Many believe that Fairfax libraries were open to everyone since their founding in 1939, but the authors' research found a hodgepodge of local rules that effectively barred Black users, not only in Fairfax but also in Loudoun and other counties. It took citizen protests and threats to cut public funds before the libraries were desegregated in the late 1950's and 1960s.
