The nomination describes her numerous other volunteer and leadership activities including her work with AAUW. She currently serves as our Secretary. She also organizes events such as game nights, holiday luncheons and often hosts AAUW events at her lovely home.



BUT HERE ARE OUR TOP 9 REASONS: (It's all we could fit!)

- More than 320 recipients received \$6 million in AAUW fellowships and grants for the 2022–23 academic
 year—the highest amount in our history! The funding advances educational and professional opportunities
 for women in the United States and around the globe.
- In the third year of the pandemic, AAUW continued to grow its online programs, hosting more than 58 webinars.
- AAUW's Start Smart and Work Smart salary negotiation trainings continued to be AAUW's most soughtafter programs, reaching more than 4,000 participants in 2022, and over 190,000 to date.
- We continued our work with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and other minority-serving institutions (MSIs), thanks to a generous grant from The Coca-Cola Foundation. - THE SIMPLE TRUTH ABOUT THE GENDER PAY GAP, 2022 Update used the earnings ratio of all workers for the first time including seasonal and part-time employees to capture a more accurate picture of the labor market. Previous versions of the report used only data of full-time workers.

A Preview of Some Proposed Programs for 2023-24

Antarctica

Hear about the Earth's southernmost, least populated continent, its penguins, seals, magnificent ice scapes, and stunning colors from four Mt Vernon branch members who recently visited Antarctica. Maybe they can also talk about the devastating impact of climate



change on that continent. Travelers are Patsy Quick, Bianca Daugherty, Susan Farmer, and Cheryl Spohnholtz.

Women Playwrights Fight to Close the Gender Gap



Five mid-career women playwrights responded to industry male bias by forming Pipeline Playwrights to provide "page to

the stage" support to get their plays before an audience. Their November 2023 production, *Wednesdays in Mississippi* by Nicole Burton, focuses on the 1964 civil rights activism of an interracial group of women in Mississippi, led by Dorothy Height of the National Council of Negro Women.

Black Women We Need to Know More About— Black History Month

Dr. Brenda Mitchell-Powell's chief finding in her break-through book on civil rights history, *Public in Name Only,* is that the struggle for integration began with the first civil rights sit-in in 1939, long before *Brown v. Board of Education* in 1954. The Alexandria sit-in, she argues, anticipated integration that began in 1959.



Barbara Rose Johns, at age 16, led a walkout by students at Robert Russa Moton High School in Prince Edward County, in 1951, protesting inequality of the school system under "separate but equal"

legislation. After NAACP lawyers supported the walkout by filing suit in 1954 in Richmond, the case became one of five cases the US Supreme Court reviewed in Brown v. Board of Education in



Topeka, KS. AAUW Mt. Vernon might enjoy hearing a speaker from Moton Museum in Farmville, VA.

Rosa E. Byrd, chairs the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Committee in Alexandria and participated in the Community Remembrance Project's pilgrimage to Montgomery, Alabama, fall 2022. After 50 years of community activism, ranging from support for community policing, to fighting for



quality education for all students, she was named an Alexandria "Living Legend."

After working with Senate leaders and their staffs on the <u>Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)</u>, AAUW's national policy team attended the ERA press conference after the <u>Senate Joint Resolution 4</u> fell short of the 60 votes needed to remove the deadline for the ratification of the ERA as part of the Constitution. We are heartened that the door is open for the Senate to reconsider the bill and will continue to fight for ERA's passage.
