


Speakers Discuss the Struggle to Desegregate Public Facilities in Virginia Black History Month Program—February 29

Brenda Mitchell-Powell explored the resistance in Alexandria to allowing blacks to use the Alexandria Library on Queen Street. In 1939, a black Alexandria attorney, Samuel Wilbert Tucker, who lived just down the street from the library, organized a sit-in demonstration at the library, the first civil rights action of its kind.

Brenda explains the causes and consequences of the sit-in as well as its historical context, the Jim Crow era, in her book *Public in Name Only: The 1939 Alexandria Library Sit-In Demonstration.* For sale at the Lyceum in Alexandria. Wilma Jones gave us an insider's view into the segregated neighborhoods and schools of Arlington. After the Supreme Court mandated integration of public schools, Virginia passed state laws to resist integration as part of five years of Massive Resistance."

Wilma's book *Halls Hill: More Than a*Neighborhood, explains how residents of segregated black neighborhoods supported each other. Her book discusses how blacks in Arlington fought for desegregation primarily because of the inadequacy of education facilities for blacks under segregation. Her book is sold at The Black Heritage Museum of Arlington. And it may also may be purchased on Amazon.

Friday afternoon sightseeing tours will be scheduled starting at 2:00 p.m. to give you a chance to enjoy Lynchburg.


