

RECAP OF OUR NOVEMBER BRANCH PROGRAM

"In the silence I discovered these unexpected musicians."

or music educator, **Annie Ray**, everything changed on a Covid lockdown day in 2020 when she heard the unexpected sound of kids talking and laughing in the otherwise silent halls of Annandale High School. She discovered the source of these happy sounds was a group of CAT-B special ed students who had returned to school because their needs couldn't be met online.

"The world had gone quiet, but in the silence I discovered these unexpected musicians," she recently told an audience of AAUW Mt. Vernon and Alexandria branch members at Sherwood Regional Library.

The "unexpected musicians" Annie encountered had severe intellectual and developmental disabilities and, therefore, were not in her general music class. Yet it was they who transformed her approach toward teaching and toward music itself. To discover what their curriculum looked like and how she could apply music to their needs, she consulted all the professionals in the school who worked with the CAT-B students. Welcoming her interest, they responded with "Learn from us." After that, they were a team.

"My team taught me everything I know," Annie said, but so did her disabled students. For them she created the **Crescendo Orchestra**, a curriculum of its own. Using an approach similar to the Suzuki method of music education, Annie formed a relationship between student, teacher, and parent. Out of this concept emerged the **Parents Orchestra** to help caregivers understand the musical challenges their student faces. The 215 members of the Parents Orchestra meet twice a month and are obligated to learn how to play their child's instrument.

Annie's teaching is driven by the goal of "meeting kids where they are." This does not mean lowering standards but rather leaving behind the traditional standards of success in favor of the idea that success may "look different for each kid." Redefining success may mean "simply doing something you've never done before."

Among her students is wheelchair-bound, non-verbal **Dean** who "redefined what success meant to me" as he learned to pluck along with his peers on a violin, modified for him, so that it has only one string. Another is **Kevin**, who when she handed him a cello

and a bow, "began bowing back and forth, his eyes filled with tears. There was a connection." She is always learning something new. "These unexpected musicians teach me more than I can ever teach them," she said.

As she reevaluated concepts of success and failure, she discovered the "in-between part, the part that brings joy. The Musicking." When her very diverse students play together, "they are connecting." She noted, however, that "there's nothing wrong with pushing students toward excellence but not at the cost of feeling the joy of the music."

Parents often comment that their student has "come out of his shell." They also tell her that since joining the orchestra their child performs better in other aspects of the curriculum

This is how Annie puts it: "Let me find where you are. Let me pull you along and let you become more than you ever thought you would be." This means "being willing to make a loud, wrong sound and being willing to laugh at it." Because music is "inherently human," you don't have to be able to speak to make music.

In addition to being Orchestra Director and Performing Arts Department Chair at Annandale High School, Annie is also a performing harpist. This year she won a Music Educator Grammy and was also named Fairfax County Public Schools Outstanding Secondary School teacher. Actress Meryl Streep attended the Grammy Awards and made a point of talking to Annie. "A music educator had a huge impact on her life," she said. "Thanks to a music educator, I am where I am today."

Sadly, music programs are often the first thing to go when it comes to budget cuts. Not only should music education be retained, Annie counters, but it should become a core subject for every student.

"I'm an open book," Annie said and invited AAUW members to connect with her on Facebook or Instagram and on her Motherhood and Music Education website. To stay in the loop on advocacy happenings, she suggested the Fairfax Arts

Coalition for Education and support this new National Association for Music Education call-to-action:

Congress has passed a continuing resolution (CR) that extends current government funding levels until December 20th. While the CR staves off a government shutdown, it also provides advocates with additional time to reach out to their members of Congress and share their support for music education!

The house appropriations committee approved its FY25 proposal for Labor-HHS-Education funding, which not only slashes Title I funding by 25%, but also proposes the complete elimination of Title II funding. In addition to slashing funding for two of the Department of Education's (ED) most vital programs. the current proposal would eliminate the only Department of Education program focused on supporting the arts, the Assistance for Arts Education (AAE) program. To rationalize the elimination of AAE the appropriation committee's report stated "funding provided by the Department should be focused on core education such as reading, writing, and math." This rationalization ignores the well-rounded focus of ESSA, as well as the benefits the arts provide across subject areas.

To encourage continued (and expanded) funding of the performing arts, she suggested contacting members of the Board of Supervisors at Fairfax County Public Schools.



HAPPY EATING - THE YUMMY SECRET OF PLANT BASED FOOD

AAUW member, **Susan Farmer**, hosted a lunch to introduce a lifestyle that emphasizes whole-food, plant-based foods (WFPB) and moderately includes meats, seafood, and milk products.

Turned off by vegetarian and vegan? This is a gentler approach to happy eating.

Susan, a Master Naturalist and retired science teacher, demonstrated the joy of a diet that focuses on plants, including vegetables, fruits, whole grains, legumes, seeds, and nuts, and that excludes refined foods, added sugars, white flour, and processed oil. Shifting your focus to minimally processed foods and eating from the list above is not only heart-healthy, but this food lifestyle may reduce risks of cancer, diabetes, and cognitive decline.

The unspoken question at the lunch was—Does it taste good?

Susan put us to work cutting, stirring, cooking, and baking. After an intense hour, we each had a beautiful plate of colorful, nutritious food.

YES! Every dish was delicious!

To learn more about plant-based cooking download Dr. Michael Greger's app, "Daily Dozen." I couldn't resist ordering Greger's cookbook with the catchy title, *The How Not to Die Cookbook*. Another Susanrecommended resource is the book *Good Energy* by Dr. Casey Means. Or consult the website of EWG (Environmental Working Group) for the latest information on healthy choices.



Curried Cauliflower, Grape & Lentil Salad

CAULIFLOWER: 1 head cauliflower (divided into florets), 1 % tsp water, 1 % tbsp curry powder, 1/4 tsp sea salt

GREEN CURRY TAHINI DRESSING: 4 ½ tbsp green curry paste (or store-bought, though fresh is best) 2 tbsp tahini, 2 tbsp lemon juice, 1 tbsp maple syrup, 1 pinch each salt and black pepper, water to thin

SALAD: 5-6 cups mixed greens, kale, spinach (or other green of choice), 1 cup cooked lentils (rinsed and drained),1 cup red or green grapes (halved), Fresh cilantro (optional)

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (204 C). Line a baking sheet (or more as needed) with parchment paper. Add cauliflower to a mixing bowl and toss with coconut oil (or water), curry powder,

and sea salt. Transfer to the baking sheet and roast cauliflower for 20-25 minutes or until golden brown and tender. Prepare the dressing by adding green curry paste, tahini, lemon juice, maple syrup, salt, and pepper to a mixing bowl and whisking to combine. If needed, thin with water until pourable. Taste and adjust flavor as needed, adding more green curry paste for a stronger curry flavor, tahini for greater thickness, lemon juice for acidity, or maple syrup for sweetness.

Assemble salad by adding lettuce to a serving platter or bowl. Top with lentils, grapes, and cooked cauliflower, and serve with dressing. Optional: garnish with fresh cilantro.

Best served fresh. Store leftovers in an airtight container for 3-4 days. Store dressing separately for up to 1 week.
