


# **CO-PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE**

### $\mathcal D$ ear members:

Many of us are appalled by the disrespectful treatment and likely illegal wholesale firing of federal employees across the government. You also may have family members who are affected, as we do. In addition to hurting hardworking employees, this will disrupt programs that are critical to so many, such as Veterans, minorities, and women.

AAUW has long supported DEI programs, which have now been obliterated throughout government, and has backed other programs, such as Title IX, which is administered by the Department of Education. As noted in <u>AAUW's 2024 annual report</u>,

AAUW advocated for stronger Title IX rules to protect survivors of sexual assault and harassment, clarify protections for pregnant and parenting students, and include LGBTQ+ students. While updated rules were issued by the U.S. Department of Education they were later vacated by a federal court in January 2025. AAUW will continue to fight for Title IX enforcement.



This year AAUW CEO, **Gloria Blackwell**, issued a statement regarding the President's nominee to the Department of Education.

AAUW calls on the Senate to reject McMahon's nomination and demand a leader who will uphold the mission of the Department of Education: to expand opportunity, protect civil rights, and invest in students' success. Anything less would be a betrayal of our nation's commitment to educational equity and opportunity for all.

On February 19, the Senate HELP committee sent **Ms. McMahon's** nomination to the full Senate and undoubtedly in short order she will be confirmed. Despite having a hand-picked person to run DoEd, the President still intends to try to shut down the Department of Education (and other agencies providing important services to our citizens), which would end all the programs AAUW supports.

If these actions perturb or anger you, instead of despairing, please speak up!!! Share your thoughts and stories you may have about the impact of furloughs, reductions in force and firings with your elected representatives. It is easy to do. Just put their name in your web browser and choose their official site. Phone numbers and an option to send written messages are provided. Our officials need this information to mount a defense and to spread the word across the nation (beyond Washington Post and NYT readers) about the impact the President's actions are having on issues AAUW supports.

On March 15, 10:00 a.m. at the virtual Annual Business Meeting (ABM) branch members will vote on the nominations. Nominations from the floor are welcome.



#### **Microaggressions and DEI—The Impact on Our Lives**

Two experts on microaggression and DEI, **Patty Hagen** and **Meg Tuccillo**, raised attendees' awareness of how we are all impacted by these practices and ideas.

Patty Hagen, who spent 36 years in the Federal Government promoting equal opportunity and championing inclusion, noted that diversity is not just about how we look. It's about everything we are. Equity involves making all people feel part of the One, and inclusion ensures that all people are heard and seen.

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A minority, Patty said, is made up of "people who have little power, especially in a system that discriminates." When we "minoritize" a group of people, they feel unseen and unheard. And racism occurs by "assigning inferiority to a group of people depending on the package they come in." Although discrimination was declared illegal in 1964, "it happens every day in this country."

It may express itself unconsciously, as a microaggression, "the everyday verbal, nonverbal, and environmental slights, snubs, or insults,

whether intentional or unintentional that communicate hostile, derogatory, or negative messages to target persons based solely upon their marginalized group membership." (Cited under the Raven Approach.)

An example is Patty's experience with an African-American friend. The two women were walking down the hall at work when Patty said, "I don't see color." Her friend stopped short and stared at Patty. "Then you don't see me," she said. It marked the beginning of Patty's understanding of microaggression.

Another example is complimenting a black person for being "so articulate" with a look of wonder on your face.

Meg Tuccillo, who served as an Assistant Superintendent in Arlington's Public Schools for 17 years where she also coordinated Title IX, described the discrimination African Americans experience as something whites often don't know about, such as her friend's inability to return an item to a jewelry store. She as a white person tried to return the same item and got all her money back, no questions asked.



To combat microaggressions—which sometimes feel macro—Meg suggested using the five-part **Raven** Approach:

Redirect—intervene

**A**sk—probing questions for clarity **V**alues—clarify, "You know in AAUW, we…"

Emphasize—your own thoughts and feelings

Next—steps, decide what to do next time

Meg described her experience of being in a shop with a basket full of items, getting ready to pay when she heard the shop owner use the N-word. She set down her basket and intervened. "I think I heard you say..." she asked, which led to a short exchange. The shopkeeper's confused answer led to Meg's saying, "You ruined it. I can't shop here," as she left her basket of items and walked out. Another customer followed her out.

The program concluded with a lively discussion. Both speakers are active members of AAUW.
