

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A DREAM DEFERRED FOR 25 YEARS: BRINGING CHERRY BLOSSOMS TO THE TIDAL BASIN

On April 17, 2025, writer, editor, and former journalist, **Diana Parsell** fascinated a large audience at Sherwood Regional Library with stories about the trail blazing, 19th century photographer/ journalist, **Eliza Scidmore**.

Parsell was working in Indonesia when she came across a guidebook about the area by an E.R. Scidmore. Back in Washington, she decided to explore this author at the Library of Congress.

Eliza Ruhamah Scidmore (1856-1928) "turned out to be even more extraordinary than I expected," she said. Parsell discovered that her many travel books were very popular at a time that did not favor working women. A main reason for her popularity is that



Americans did not travel much in those days. "She blazed trails to tourism when tourism was just taking off," Parsell noted.



In 1873 Scidmore went to Oberlin College and dropped out after 1.5 years. But George Washington University gave her an honorary doctorate in 1919 in recognition of her travel writing. As soon as she got her PhD, she joined AAUW.

As a reporter she attended the 1876 World's Fair in Philadelphia and wrote five articles under her middle name, Ruhamah. Inspired by the glaciologist, John Muir, Scidmore traveled by mail steamer along the inside passage to Alaska. As the first tourist to sail into Glacier Bay, she reported on Alaska for 15 years, producing writings that so impressed the scientists at the National Geographic Society that she ultimately became their first corresponding secretary.

Although her dream to plant Japanese cherry trees along the tidal basin was deferred for 25 years, she never gave up on it. The dream began with Scidmore's ride in a cage to the top of the unfinished

Washington Monument in 1883. Looking down on a muddy swamp from the top, Scidmore thought and later wrote, "one day this will be a magnificent park."

When she visited her brother George, serving as U.S. consul in Japan, she had the opportunity to witness the beauty of Japanese cherry trees. Remembering that view from the Washington Monument and the muddy swamp below, she used every opportunity to promote her idea of bringing cherry trees to Washington DC. Finally when she mentioned the idea to First Lady, Helen Taft, wife of the 27th president William Howard Taft (1909-1914), she received a positive response. On April 7, 1909 Helen Taft wrote Scidmore a letter saying she very much liked the idea of planting cherry trees in Potomac Park.


Parsell did much of her research on the life of Eliza Scidmore and the so-called "Gilded Age" of her era at the Library of Congress. Today she is a docent at the Library, where she leads tours for visitors.
